Sensibility about Sensing: Lindsay Rand Releases New CISSM Policy Brief



How might quantum technology revolutionize nuclear deterrence? CISSM Research Associate Lindsay Rand's new CISSM Policy Brief, "Sensibility about Sensing: A Socio-Technical Evaluation of Quantum Sensing Implications for Nuclear Deterrence," tackles this question. It is based on Rand's prize-winning dissertation, which develops a novel socio-technical framework for assessing the effects of emerging technologies on strategic stability and applies it to quantum sensing. Rand's work goes beyond technical specifics, incorporating crucial social factors influencing perceptions of emerging technologies. This brief provides valuable insights for policymakers, researchers, and those interested in the nexus of technology and global security. Disaster Business: Catherine Worsnop Explores How Natural Disasters Fuel Human Trafficking in Latest Publication



In a new publication co-authored with Kathleen Vogel, CISSM Research Fellow **Catherine Z. Worsnop** sheds light on the alarming connection between natural disasters and human trafficking. Worsnop argues that the financial and political incentives of post-disaster reconstruction can create conditions that facilitate human trafficking. Through rigorous data analysis, the article demonstrates that natural disasters can serve as a magnet for trafficking, especially in cases of more damaging disasters, where governments have political incentives to rebuild, and where anti-trafficking capacity is weak. This groundbreaking research highlights the need for targeted policy interventions to disrupt the relationship between disasters and human trafficking.
